#### VALENTINE'S DAY DANCE




There will be a Valentine's Day Dance after school on Friday, February 16. It will start at 3:15 and go until 5:00. Admission is \$5.00.

## **FOOD BANK**

On Friday, December 22, 2017, 8th graders from Eileen Johnson Middle School went to Billings Food Bank. The 8th graders that went had worked to have one or less ICU Assignments. There were about 30 kids who went with two teachers, Mr. Karls and Mrs. Ryan. Mr. Karls was the one that had organized the activity with the Food Bank. It not only helped the kids enjoy helping people and learning life skills, it also helped the people in need. Mr. Karls was happy to help keep the middle schoolers in line and participate. Helping the food bank brought many kids together and gave them a chance to give back to the community. The holiday was just around the corner. Mr. Karls, Mrs. Ryan and the 8th graders helped make and give people food boxes and baskets and sorted the donated items into sections. In the end, 8th graders filled about 400 boxes and gave away about 100 turkeys and shopping carts full of food.

The food bank normally get about 10-15 thousand people a month. The food bank helps with more than just giving people food. It also helps people get employment and trains people to work in the food department. The food from the food bank comes from private donations, and they raise money and buy food from the store. They keep it organized by food groups. They get a lot of help from organizations that come and help give out food and help organize. A lot of student groups help too. There is no age limit to help or eat at the food bank.

This is the first year Mr. Karls took 8th graders to the food bank. He often goes with his wife during the holidays. Mr. Karls wanted to use the trip as a motivator for the students to stay off of ICU. He noticed that there were 60 kids who had 2 or less ICU assignments and 40 students that did not have any at all. He was testing the 8th graders to see if it would help keep them off ICU. His test motivated a lot of kids. He is planning another trip but not to the food bank this time. He was think something like Get Air. If anyone has other ideas they can talk to him.

## HIGH SCHOOL UPDATE

After many years of thinking of a Lockwood High School, the plan is actually coming together. In 2017, a vote was projected to see how many people were interested in having a high school, and over two-thirds said yes. On January 10, 2018 a meeting at the Lockwood Fire Station was held for anyone who was interested in putting their ideas towards the Lockwood High School. Many people came including: Elizabeth Kamminga, Sydney Wolfe, Kyler Tresch, Addie Nielsen, Jordon Shawver, Q Stanton, Marina Davis, Michelle Dawson, Gordon Klasna, Tim Sather, and Tobin Novasio, plus many more. Nick Pancheau of Collaborate Architecture presented everyone many different ideas on where the high school could go, but most people are for Site A which is on the Lockwood School's campus. There are currently nine sites that are possible areas for the high school to go, but Site A and B are the top areas that are most commonly favored. Some of Site A's ideas for the high school were: a Vo-ag facility, auditorium, track, soccer, and football field, new softball field, new parking and easier entry, a tournament gym, a regular gym for dances and other use, and tennis courts. Later in the discussion, they talked about easier ways to help teach students, such as: online learning, community outreach to the career center, interactive multimedia, larger spaces in rooms so it is not so packed, and easier teaching systems.

Then discussion was held on what was most important in specific groups: athletics and community, academics, safety and security, operations and maintenance, and sustainability. In the athletics and community group these were the most recommended ideas: pool, stadium, auditorium, library, community access, meeting rooms, tournaments, festivals, concessions, air conditioner, college classes, weight room, cultural activities, tennis courts, and golf team. In the academics group these were most talked about: library, separate band and choir rooms, vo-ag facility, art, STEM, 3D printers, Native American Education, and new projectors. Safety and security talked about: entrance and exits, addiction help, traffic flow and limited access. In operations and maintenance the most commonly suggested things were: a practical design, no flat roofs, Gipon wiring, flexibility, acoustical separation, quiet flooring, and storage. Lastly in the sustainability group, they talked about: the high school being flexible over time, a greenhouse, solar panels, and LED lights.

Many ideas were inputted, and the architects can not wait for more, we hope you can join the next meeting on January 24, 2018, at the Lockwood Administration Building.
